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Translational Medicine: The Future for Sri Lanka



Translational medicine is a rapidly growing discipline in biomedical research which aims to expedite the discovery of new diagnostic tools and treatments by using a multi-disciplinary, highly collaborative approach. Translational medicine as a concept, is a bi-directional concept, which encourages the flow of information from the laboratory to the clinic, and in the

same way, from the clinic back to the laboratory. This bi-directional concept of "Bench to Bedside" factors, aim to increase the efficiency by which new therapeutic strategies are developed through basic research and are tested clinically, whereas the "Bedside-to-Bench" factors, provide feedback about the applications of new treatments and how they can be improved.

This bi directional concept falls into the 'T'- Phases of Translational Health Research as T0 through T4. These five multi-step phases turn observations in the lab, clinic and community into interventions that improve people's lives in the form of diagnostics, therapeutics, medical procedures, devices and even behavioural changes. For this, translation, a team with diverse skills is crucial. A group that would come together and work as a team to make a real impact in patient's lives. This team is put together, as the fundamental characteristics of individual researchers go beyond individual specialization. For the success of the translational research, this team needs to think innovatively and collaboratively, and search for ways to break down barriers and improve patients' lives.

Sri Lanka needs to make its way forward in research, thinking out of the box, and not reinventing the wheel, but thinking of ways that could prevent and cure Sri Lankans from diseases. As young researchers, translational research produces tremendous opportunities for innovations and systematic change, to develop

solutions specially in developing medicines better, faster and more efficiently. This provides boundless promise to future researchers to transform biomedical research and medicine. As young budding innovative thinkers, this translational research needs to be a patient focused approach, which would ensure that the patient's perspective is included in every step of the research. This would help us not only, as future researchers, would also help Sri Lanka become a healthier nation.

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
